9:00 Conference Welcome. *Carl Kurz, KIUC Executive Director and Conference Moderator.*

9:15 Direction of Energy Policy. *Charles G. Snavely, Secretary, Kentucky Energy and Environmental Cabinet.* Mr. Snavely was appointed Secretary of the Kentucky Energy and Environment Cabinet by Governor Matt Bevin in December 2015. As head of the Cabinet, his mission is to provide regulatory guidance, environmental awareness, and to implement an energy strategy that will bring economic benefits to the Commonwealth while protecting the environment and improving the quality of life for Kentucky businesses, workers, and the public in general. Secretary Snavely will address current issues facing the Cabinet and the future direction of energy policy in Kentucky.

9:45 Utility Panel: Pros and Cons of PJM. *Dana Horton, AEP's Director RTO Regulatory East, John Verderame, Duke Energy Corporation's Managing Director of Power Trading and Dispatch, and Don Mosier, EKPC's Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer.* Since 2004, several Kentucky electric utilities have chosen to join PJM Interconnection, LLC, a regional transmission organization. How do they feel about that decision in 2018? Three utility experts will weigh in on their experiences and what changes, if any, they would like to see in the coming years.

11:00 Production, Policy and the Future of Coal in Kentucky. *J. Tyler White, President, Kentucky Coal Association.* J. Tyler White was named President of the Kentucky Coal Association in December 2016. Mr. White previously acted as District Director for Kentucky's Sixth District Congressman, Andy Barr, and served in the U.S. Marine Corps. Mr. White will provide his insights with respect to the current and future status of coal in the Commonwealth.

11:30 Smart Grid. *David Huff, Director of Customer Energy Efficiency and Smart Grid Strategy, LG&E and KU Energy.* With nearly 35 years of experience in the electric utility industry, Mr. Huff is currently responsible for the planning and implementation of emerging technology programs at LG&E and KU, including advanced metering services, electric vehicle charging stations, and solar programs. Mr. Huff will discuss the investments those utilities are making to improve operational efficiencies through grid modernization.

1:15 Cybersecurity: Managing Risks. *Eric Slavinsky, Chief Information Officer, LG&E and KU Energy.* Mr. Slavinsky serves as the principal information technology lead for LG&E and KU Energy, drawing upon more than twenty years of experience in the field. Mr. Slavinsky will share his insights on the cybersecurity challenges facing the electric power industry, the latest trends in cybersecurity, and what actions industry is taking to improve protections of the grid.

1:45 Federal Energy Issues. *John P. Hughes, President & CEO, Electricity Consumers Resource Council (ELCON).* Having joined ELCON in 1987 as Director of Technical Affairs, Mr. Hughes is now president of one of the largest and most highly regarded electric energy consumer trade groups in the country. He will explain several national energy issues facing large industrial customers and how federal energy and environmental policies are changing under the Trump administration.

2:30 Low-Income Advocacy. *Tom FitzGerald, Director, Kentucky Resources Council.* Mr. FitzGerald has worked to protect the interests of low-income Kentuckians as part of the Kentucky Resources Council since 1984 and has been involved in major environmental issues in Kentucky since the early 1970s. A frequent participant in cases before the Kentucky Public Service Commission, Mr. FitzGerald will discuss the ins and outs of low-income advocacy in the Commonwealth.

3:00 Natural Gas Market Outlook. *Dan Grieshop, Scheduling and Supply Services Manager for the Energy and Supply and Optimization Group at Nisource Corporation.* Natural gas shale production has brought low and steady prices to the energy market place. However, will there be enough shale supply to keep up with increased industrial demand, natural gas power generation and LNG exports? Using his experience planning for six local gas distribution companies from Kentucky to Massachusetts, Dan will provide a short-term and long-term outlook for natural gas prices from a utility perspective.
